Undocumented Sovereign Americans

During my years of study, I've learned some important lessons. One such lesson is that a person shouldn't complain about a police state if he voluntarily cooperates with it.

Voluntary participation equals endorsement.

Compare that to the smug drivel that the authorities like to promote: "If you don't vote, then don't complain." What nonsense. If you **do** vote, then don't complain. You agreed in advance to the consequences when you voluntarily registered as a voter. Refusing to register as a voter is one of the prerequisites of having a legitimate right to complain.

Of course, the determination that behavior is voluntary isn't as simple as it might seem. A man will voluntarily jump from the top of a building, if the building is burning under him. You don't have to push him. He'll "choose" to do it. That doesn't mean that he wants to do it and it doesn't mean that it's voluntary.

In early 1972, I "chose" to join the Naval Reserve. The only alternatives were to escape to Canada, to stay in the United States as a criminal, or to be drafted. Today, I might do things differently. In 1972, and in accordance with my brainwashing, I joined the Naval Reserve. The point is that any possible good alternatives had been eliminated before I ever had an opportunity to make my choice. I was constrained by the police state to select from only alternatives that were undesirable. The result was to compel me to "voluntarily" make the choice that the authorities wanted me to make. I was occasionally reminded, during my subsequent "tour of duty", that I shouldn't complain about my situation because I'd "volunteered".

Today, more than 40 years later, there isn't any improvement. Here's an excerpt from the little Selective Service System brochure that you can get at the Post Office.

What Happens If I Don't Register?

Not registering is a felony. Young men prosecuted and convicted of failure to register may be fined up to \$250,000, imprisoned for up to five years, or both. Failure to register also may cause men to permanently lose eligibility for student financial aid, government employment, job training, and U.S. citizenship for male immigrants.

Registration for the draft is as good an example as any other. Refusal to cooperate will be punished. Cooperation, even when it's coerced, will be construed as voluntary.

I demonstrated in my essay [The Long and Winding Doctrine: Social Contract](#), available on *Pharos*, that the legitimate boundaries of lawful government are not geographical. They are contractual. Thus, we're within the jurisdiction not because of where we live but because of how we live. We apply for driver's licenses, marriage licenses, building permits, and business licenses. We register to vote. Such actions, and others, create obligations to the jurisdiction of the police state. Our obligations are proved by the records that we create, the licenses that we hold, the permits that we have received, and the applications that we've submitted. Even citizenship invokes the jurisdiction.

All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States....

—*Constitution for the United States of America*
Amendment 14, clause 1

To escape from the jurisdiction, to become sovereigns, we must divest ourselves of such obligations by becoming undocumented. I suggest the little essay [Those Chains That Bind You!](#). It's available in *The Sovereign's Library*.

Another lesson that I learned is that before a person can become undocumented, he must position himself. That is, he must rearrange his life so that it's possible for him to survive without the documentation. That's true because →

the authorities have acquired monopolies on access to nearly everything. A person must submit to the jurisdiction as a prerequisite for almost everything. If we just cancel our documentation cold turkey, then we'll be back in a few months, begging to have it reinstated. That's why it's necessary to position ourselves first, before we cancel our documentation. We have to find ways to satisfy our needs without application to the police state for permission.

I got into the jurisdiction just like everybody else. My parents told me to get a Social Security number so I got a Social Security number. They told me to get a driver's license so I got a driver's license. Following the instructions of all of the various people who "educated" me, I went through the entire process, draft registration, college degree, corporate employment, life insurance, the whole thing. I was in my late 30s or early 40s before I began to realize that I'd been deceived and manipulated, that what I'd been taught was lies. After that, I put a lot of effort into trying to correct my errors, trying to get outside of the jurisdiction. I didn't have any examples or written instructions to follow. I had to improvise as I went along. I rescinded my driver's license. I cancelled my Social Security number. My second marriage was undocumented and non-ceremonial. I didn't know of any way to remove my birth certificate from the clutches of the bureaucracy that had possession of it so I made a homegrown birth certificate to use instead. Things didn't always go as planned. Along the way, I sacrificed my career as an engineer and lost my home in San Jose. Anyway, I did what I could do to get as far outside of the jurisdiction as I could get. Now, at the age of 67, I've noticed that everybody my age has undergone some kind of required medical treatment. In the past, I've stayed healthy but it seems unlikely that I'll always be as lucky as I've been so far. When people get older, they tend to get sick. Nobody knows how long I'll stay healthy and, being undocumented, I don't have access to medical treatment. That's one of the many things to which access has been monopolized by the police state. So, if I get sick, then I'll be forced once again to choose from a limited list of sev-

eral undesirable alternatives, as was the case back when I was trying to avoid being drafted and sent to Vietnam. This time, the only options available to me might be a long and painful illness or the sacrifice of my beliefs. That is, I might have to surrender to the jurisdiction of the police state, just to get some medical treatment.

Getting outside of the jurisdiction of the police state, and staying out, isn't easy. Maybe it isn't even possible. It's probably best if we never submit to the jurisdiction in the first place. Whatever the case, I've tried to make some of my experience available in my writing. Each person's situation is different. My suggestions aren't exhaustive. They won't apply in every situation. Each person must find his own path. Even so, my experience might provide some useful ideas and guidelines. I suggest my essay [Abandonment](#). It's available on *Pharos*. The whole point of the exercise is to become undocumented and escape from the jurisdiction of the police state, to become sovereign. It isn't easy and maybe it isn't even possible but, in my opinion, the effort should be made. To submit to the police state without even a struggle is, to my way of thinking, un-American. People who don't understand why it's important aren't ready to start. Some people probably won't understand it until the gestapo kicks down their door. In the meantime, it wouldn't hurt for such people to review my essay [The Principles of Liberty](#). It's available on *Pharos*.

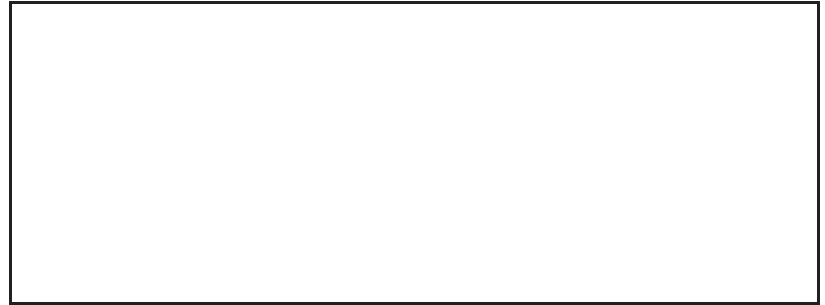
